Dear Friends in Christ,

"Between the dark tree-trunks, she could still see the open doorway of the wardrobe and even catch a glimpse of the empty room from which she had set out. It seemed to be still daylight there. I am reminded of the hospitality Mary and Joseph received, even though they acquired just simple quarters amongst the animals. The nativity reminds me of our ministry here at Christ Church. As people committed to Christ, we, too, have sought to provide shelter and warmth for the stranger.

So long ago, on that first Christmas Eve, Mary and Joseph, so young and anxious, had all they needed—friends in the shepherds, treasured support from the Magi, and angels looking upon them from overhead. Now and then, all the world needs is a friend, some provisions, and a watchful heart for others. Sometimes, all the world needs is the generosity of the Christmas Spirit all the year through. For us, Jesus' birth signifies such love!

Jesus is among us, shining brightly. And we, too, are called to be amongst each other, like the lamppost in Narnia, to be a beacon for the lost, the broken, and the hungry. We are called to cast our light and God's love on all we meet. That is the true message of Christmas: God was born among us in the incarnation, a small child who lit the world on fire and illuminated the gifts of hope, peace, joy, and love! I pray that you and your family, and those you love, will experience God's light and presence this Christmas Season and that you, too, can cast light in a seemingly dark world. A heart for Christ will always be a light brighter than the darkness!
