About this morning's music: As we move forward the 10:00 am service will have music that connects our faith to the church of today and the world around us. What we sing reflects what we believe. Music in liturgy has an important role to play in expressing our faith, reinforcing the teachings of Christ, and challenging our assumptions about how God works in the world. As you rejoice in some of the music, and struggle with others, remember that they carry the hopes and prayers of our parish. And when a new hymn comes on a Sunday morning, you are encouraged to try it to hear what God is calling out of you. Be an active participant in the liturgy and “make a joyful noise unto the Lord” as the psalmist tells us

In relation to our 10:00am service you may be noticing a recurrence of some of the material from week to week. With each week we repeat a song we pull it deeper into our bones as we worship through song. Even if you don't know a song, please, feel free to sing along. Mistakes are ok! That is how we learn.

There will also be occasional services on Sunday Evenings (6pm) of Holy Eucharist and Evensong which will use the Book of Common Prayer and traditional Anglican hymns. These services show the breadth and depth of our Anglican tradition, perhaps best framed as an “Ancient Liturgy, for a Modern Life” that draws together the mystical and mysterious nature of God, coupled with the busy nature of the world around us.
